Lou was a good family man with a wife and two sons. He got the drive-in restaurant idea when he was delivering bread for Rainbo Baking Co. to restaurants and stores.

The Lou's Burgers in North Highlands was originally called "Lou's Drive-in #2". Lou originally had a Lou's Drive-in on Grand Ave. across from Grant High School. I am not sure when he opened that one, but he sold it to a man named Ernie, hence it was called Ern's when he decided to open the Lou's Drive-in #2 in 1958.

North Highlands was a growing area and he wanted to be a part of it. My mother worked for Lou from 1959 thru 1988. She retired in 1988 due to illness. I worked for Lou from 1963 to 1965 making a whopping 95 cents an hour to start. Of course, burgers were 35 cents, french fries were 20 cents and a medium



Lou went on to venture in a few partnerships and opened three other drive-ins. They were opened at different times.

They were located at Marconi and Eastern, Auburn Blvd and Madison Ave., and the last one was on Auburn Blvd. in Citrus Heights.

Lou eventually sold his part of the partnership of those places and focused on the Lou's Burgers on Watt Ave.

Lou has passed-on but his burger will always be legacy.....It's in the "Secret Sauce".

The owner of Lou's now, has been a long time friend and partner of Lou's since 1964 (give or take a year). His name is Don, a very nice man, who is retired from the military. Not that you all really want to know this but Don taught my mom how to drive back in 1964 or 1965. He had and has a lot of patience to this day.
