Our float was a replica of the USS Arizona Memorial, with water under it and an American flag waving high above. We had alumni members Garnett Gilmore Volkens,'64, playing a WWII female military personnel, her father, William Gilmore who wore his original Navy uniform from WWII, Eveline Small Stanhope, '66, a Red Cross nurse, Diane Aspenson Olson, '67, Rosie the Riveter and Greg Lugeras, '67, an Army paratrooper. In addition, Pearl Harbor under-attack photos accessorized the float.

The float was beautiful and with servicemen and women aboard it, it was very moving and patriotic. It was fun seeing the spectators and "meeting" the community as we drove down Watt Ave.

We also had a WWII vintage Jeep decked out in Army paint owned and driven by Jim Swanson, '64 and passenger Sam Smith, '65. Both men were very handsome in their military uniforms. Also we had a vintage 1963 Ford Falcon Convertible and a 1940's military motorcycle with a side car. I'm telling you, it was something to see.

For the association to continue the good deeds and scholarship program, it is crucial that these types of fundraisers are well supported by Highlands alumni and the community.


