A Once-Proud Tradition

It was in 1958/59, Highlands High's first school year, when the student body found themselves starting new traditions. With the name of the mascot "The Scot" in place, some Scottish traditions were followed; including The Highland Fling (dance), Bagpipes, and traditional Scottish dress.

Then there was the Highlands High 188th Grenadiers Exhibition Drill Team from the Highlands Military Club. Through the years, the Highlands High Grenadiers displayed excellent ability and accuracy in rifle maneuvers and drilling techniques, with shiny twirling rifles and wearing traditional Scottish dress. They honored Highlands by presenting the United States flag at football games, parades, and social activities. Through hard work, skill, and agility, they were recognized as one of the area's best, winning numerous awards through the 1960s.

In the late 60s and through the 70s, the drill team faded away, as one can see in the yearbooks. The Scottish dress went to a military uniform, and less emphasis was placed on competition. Through the years following their heyday, Highlands still had its Honor Guard displaying the flags.

One can see in the first photo where they were highlighted in *The Sacramento Bee* in 1961 for being the best drill team that day in the Veterans Day Parade that was held Downtown Sacramento. Featured in the middle of the photo is Stephen R. Tubre (Class of 1962) marching so proudly. Stephen is one of our fallen soldiers from Highlands. He died in Vietnam in on August 31, 1968. RIP, fellow Scot!!
