2. Mary Anderson ('67) participated in fund-raising for Lou Gehrig's Disease (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis) in honor of her friend Susan Clark. All together, Mary and her friends collected close to \$2,000 to fight this dreaded disease.
3. Every year, Ron LaForm ('77) walks for WEAVE (Women Escaping a Violent Environment), a charity that serves abused women in the greater Sacramento area. Friends and co-workers make up his team. In recent years he has raised close to \$1,000 a year.
4. During the summer, Alicia Lerma and Suzan Shelly (both '72ers) have been involved with the group Power of 100 Women (POW). POW is an organization based in Placer County. Women from all walks of life support local charities. By harnessing the power of women, a much greater impact can be felt. Members of POW meet quarterly to hear presentations from three (3) nonprofit organizations. Each member commits to donating a minimum of \$100 to one of these organizations to

create a total donation of \$10,000 each quarter, or \$40,000 annually. These group fundraising efforts allow POW to have an impact that can be seen in the communities where members live, work, play, and raise their families. Together they make a difference.

5. Sherreta Lane and Andrew McDuffie ('74) participated in the Sacramento River Cats "Cats Care" program. This summer, the "Cats Care" was a picnic at Raley Field for military and their families. Fun event. (The River Cats is a farm team with the San Francisco Giants, and Sherreta is a Giants fan.)
6. Again this year, Arden Fair Mall is providing an opportunity for its shoppers to help schools throughout the Sacramento area in its "School Cents" program. One school that Highlands alumni may want to help is Main Avenue Elementary School, located about 1-1/2 miles north of Grant High School, and located west of McClellan Airfield. Whether you're buying a million dollar dress or a simple cup of coffee, you can help Main Avenue School, which is located in the Robla School District, but whose students eventually attend Twin Rivers schools.
