#### PREZ'S PONDERINGS

I'm writing this at what would be, back in the "olden days," the one-third point of summer vacation. For today's kids, it's close to the half-way point.

This past weekend, our newsletter editor Mary Anderson trekked all the way to eastern Folsom to celebrate a Highlands alumnae. Trinette Marquis ('89) has published her first book, *Engaging Data: Smart Strategies for School Communication*, aimed at those who are involved in communications for public school districts. Mary had the privilege of meeting Trinette's friends and enjoying a hamburger dinner at the Barnes and Noble, where the gathering was held.

During the presentation after dinner, Trinette talked about her passions for data and how data can be used in school communications. Communicating with parents and with those district officials (e.g., superintendents and principals) and community members (e.g., alumni associations) chosen to make decisions is vital.

How does data collecting affect the Alumni Association? Let's look at the data. Over 75% of the membership graduated during the 1960s. Those from the classes of 1965 through 1969 make up the first one-fourth of the Baby Boom. But how about those who graduated from 1970 to 1982, the last three-fourths of the Boom? Why are they a small part of our membership? Where have we not communicated with them?

In the past year, we have posted the Newsletter on the Facebook pages and on the website. We have also posted flyers for special events, such as the Golf Tournament and the Holiday Party. But is that enough? Probably not. Suggestions are welcome. One solution is to celebrate those who graduated in 1970 and later. In the newsletter's next edition, for example, an article about Trinette and all that she has accomplished since graduating from Highlands some 29+ years ago. Do you know someone who has had a book published? How about someone elected to public office? Or held a high-ranking position in the public or private sector? How about someone doing something unusual, like serve in the Peace Corps? Is a recent graduate opening his/her own business? All of that needs to be honored so that today's students can learn from all those who went before them.

We have another 5-1/2 months to ensure that we have more members on January 1, 2019, than we did on January 1, 2018. All alumni are welcome to join, be they from the first graduating class to the most recent.

## Cynthia (Cindy) Scholz By Sharon Bennett

Born August 8, 1951, died Mother's Day 2018.

I met Cindy at the end of 11<sup>th</sup> grade at Highlands, when I had transferred from Cordova High. We were both kids from a military/civil service family.

Cindy was sweet and beautiful. In Senior Year she was a majorette, and I was the studious kid. We did not interact much, except we had a couple of classes together. I graduated mid-term and went on about living my life. After graduation, Cindy's family relocated with the military.

Throughout the years I tried to go to as many class reunions as I could, and there were always the same hard-working classmates who volunteered to head up the reunions. I was fortunate to be able to go to the 45<sup>th</sup> class reunion, and they were looking for someone to lead up the 50<sup>th</sup> reunion in 2019. Although I live in Texas, I threw in my hat. As part of preparing for the reunion, I became the Administrator of the 1969 Highlands Facebook group and have been "collecting" names (friends) in all sorts of places.

I was able to catch up with Cindy. Low and behold she had been living only 6 miles away from me in San Antonio, Texas. We got together for lunch and reconnected. We found out that we both had daughters who ALSO graduated from the same high school in San Antonio. (And there are 53 high schools in San Antonio proper!) My daughter Jennifer graduated in 1989, and her daughter Liberty graduated in 1990. What a coincidence!

Unfortunately, soon after Cindy and I reconnected, she was diagnosed with stage 4 carcinoid cancer. Cindy was married to a wonderful man, Mike Hillier, and she had her

three children near her. She really struggled with the disease and was once in the ICU at a specialty hospital in New Orleans for over 100 days. During the last couple of months of Cindy's life, my husband and I would go to Cindy and Mike's house, and I would stay with her to read the Bible, rub her feet, and share family stories. My husband, Bruce, would take Mike out shopping and lunching (some beer drinking involved, I'm sure). It was absolutely our honor and a gift from God that we were able to provide some comfort to them.

Cindy lost her battle on Mother's Day this year with all of her children and grandchildren surrounding her. I miss our Thursdays together. I especially want to thank a few of our classmates (Polly Beebe, Ronneene Booth, Laura Geivett, Linda King, and Marie Small) for keeping in touch with Cindy by sending flowers and letters, and by donating resources to help with medical costs.

Until we meet again, sweet Cindy.

### Drummin' with Dan Callnon - Class of '69

How do most drummers get their start? We can bet that a lot of them started by banging on the pots and pans in their mother's kitchen when they were not much higher than their mother's knee. That's when Dan Callnon ('69) started on a musical journey that still continues.

Lucky for him, his mother and father supported him on this journey. They paid \$75 for his first drum set from Tone's Pawn Shop, which was located in Downtown Sacramento. He honed his skills with a band when he was 12 years old by practicing two or three times a week. They started out by playing primarily surf music, covering the music of the Beach Boys, the Ventures, and Jan & Dean. He eventually expanded to playing psychedelic rock and myriad selections from the British Invasion. He also picked up a few pointers by watching *The Ed Sullivan Show* every Sunday night. Right in his parents' living room, he was able to watch the greats, like Ginger Baker of Cream, Charlie Watts of the Rolling Stones, and Ringo Starr of the Beatles, among others.

Dan's school career zigged and zagged: 9<sup>th</sup> Grade – Campos Verdes, 10<sup>th</sup> Grade – Highlands, 11<sup>th</sup> Grade – Jesuit, and 12<sup>th</sup> Grade – Highlands, where he played drums in the dance band and also performed for school dances.

Like many Highlands grads from the '60s, Dan served in the Army, including a year in Vietnam, where he spent 6 months as a Wolfhound in the 25<sup>th</sup> Division and another 6 months in the 196<sup>th</sup> Infantry Brigade with the 23rd Division. He also spent time with the 82<sup>nd</sup> Airborne Division while stateside and never passed up a chance to play in some of the USO clubs while serving his time. Close to 50 years later, he gives presentations about his time as an infantryman (grunt) in Vietnam for his nephew's

U.S. History students at Reno High. He uses music and sound bites to communicate his thoughts and feelings to the students. (Maybe we can have him speak at his alma mater to those whose grandparents and great grandparents lived during that era.)

Dan also used music as a tool to transition back to civilian life. Listening to music helped him deal with some of the demons of war. He was one of many who connects to Vietnam by playing "Run Through The Jungle" and "Fortunate Son," hits by Credence Clearwater Revival; "Shelter From The Storm" by the Stones; Eric Burden's "We Gotta' Get Out Of This Place"; "With A Little Help From My Friends" by Joe Cocker; and the Beatles' "Let It Be", just to name a few.

After playing in Blues, Rock, Country, Rhythm & Blues, Americana, Jazz, and Hillbilly Surf bands for a number of years, Dan founded the group Keep on Truckin' in 2011. The band is a tribute to the "Woodstock Generation" and plays covers from the '60s and '70s with a few other selections in the mix. Over the years, the band has played for a number of charity benefits, including Wounded Warriors, the U.C. Davis Children's Miracle Network, Tommy Apostolos Fund (a charity that helps disadvantaged children in Roseville), and the Alzheimer's Foundation. They have also performed for various 'Concerts in the Park' series, wineries, weddings, fairs, and festivals in and around the greater Sacramento area, the Bay Area, and the Reno/Tahoe area. A future gig includes playing next year for the 50-year reunion of the class of '69.
